## Switzerland - Quotas Nearly Met for 2010



As reported previously, new applications for L (short term) and B (long term) permits for non-EU/EEA nationals were significantly reduced for 2010. As a result, the annual quotas have nearly been exhausted only two months into the year.

Although the Swiss authorities previously indicated that they would re-evaluate the quotas in June 2010, the cantons have requested the authorities review and allocate more spaces prior to this time. Emigra Ogletree Worldwide will continue to monitor the quota situation and keep you updated.

### What you need to do...

- Be aware that the quotas have now nearly been exhausted for 2010. To avoid delays and/or refusal due to the unavailability of quota space, new work permit applications should be made as soon as possible.
