
Stricter post-entry registration requirements:

Brexit: what is going to happen?



The UK will leave the EU on 29 March 2019; separation negotiations still underway



A Brexit transition period will run until 31 December 2020, during which time EU nationals will retain free movement rights in the UK



EU nationals residing in the UK before the end of the transition period will need to apply for status - the Home Office has promised this will be online and straightforward



Five years residence will lead to settled status with a bridging presettled status for new arrivals



Companies should identify who their impacted employees are in both the UK and the EU; consider moving EU nationals to the UK prior to Brexit



Beginning in 2021, companies will need to apply for work visas for EU nationals
